Who is this book for?

This book has been designed for you, *foreigners in Turkey or in your home lands*, who want to acquire the basic grammar of Turkish at a very simple level in order to make their stay more rewarding. Since you wish to communicate for different purposes when in Turkey, you will learn, for example, how to give information about yourselves and to ask for similar information about other people, how to express your likes or dislikes, agree or disagree, how to apologize, accept or refuse invitations and so on. The book will also provide you with some background information and exercises in Turkish.

What is the framework of this book?

The Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEF) was taken into consideration during the preparation of this book. The CEF views language knowledge as a set of skills and strategies which are needed to use a language for communication in real-life situations.

How to use this book

This book is designed to acquaint you with the basic vocabulary and grammar that will help you to be able to understand Turkish structure. In order to make the book practical, you are provided with many exercises you might need. As this book is not written for linguists, elaborate definitions are avoided. Grammar is explained in a clear and straightforward manner, and the use of grammatical terms is excluded whenever possible. A number of examples are provided to support grammar learning and through these examples, you are introduced with actual language in different contexts.

At the end of the book, an answer key, an index and glossary are provided to make this book user-friendly.

Some general tips about how to practice Turkish

Everybody has their own learning style. Try some of the suggestions given here as a hint and find out how to accelerate your practice in Turkish. In order to succeed, remember:

- every language reflects a different way of thinking, and some rules in Turkish might NOT always sound logical when compared to the rules of your language.
- do not try to find a logical explanation behind every single phenomenon you come across. Just try to learn it as it is.
- be positive when you are faced with the difficulties of the language. Learning a new language can enrich you in many ways.
- make the efforts to think in Turkish from the start as much as possible. This will activate your vocabulary.
- whenever you find an opportunity, try to repeat the words or instructions in your mind.
- understanding grammar is just the first step. You should learn the patterns in the examples given rather than just learn abstract rules. This will help you remember the rules when to apply them. Practice comes with practice.
- do not rush onto the next unit until you feel confident that you have thoroughly mastered the structures introduced in the previous unit.
- apply what you have added to your knowledge with different examples. You will then be ready for the next stage.
- repeat the new words and phrases several times because it is the easiest way to learn them. After that, you should write these expressions a few times. This activity will accelerate your learning.
- try to use a new word or phrase in a sentence of your own. This can be done any time (e.g., while going to work or university, or even waiting for a bus).
- try to watch Turkish programs on television. Do not worry if you do not understand much of it.
- you are not a native speaker. Therefore, you will have an accent and make mistakes. Try to do your best; your aim is to be understood- not to be perfect.
- You should listen to Turkish songs and try to learn some of the words.

In any case, just listening to Turkish being spoken while out will help your pronunciation and intonation tremendously.

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
